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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

What a spectacular BHCA 2023 Holiday Lighting Festival our community had this past December 10. Everybody had a fantastic time in spite of some occasional rain. Congratulations to our Programs Committee and all their contributors for a job well done; please see photos elsewhere in our Beacon. The turnout was incredible and we on the BHCA Board and other volunteer helpers couldn't be more proud. We hope you had a chance to enjoy the videos posted on Facebook, including the coverage of our event from BaysideLiveTV. Thanks to everybody for your above and beyond collaborative efforts and for joining us!

As we enter the new year, throughout all media, we see aid of former Rep. Gary Ackerman and the cooperation retrospectives everywhere. With that in mind, how about of then Flushing postmaster William Rogers, Bayside a Bayside Hills Civic Association retrospective? What have we been doing and what have been some of our accomplishments over the past twenty years?

One of our greatest triumphs was the elimination of massive floods incurred due to antiquated and inadequate storm sewers and seepage basins. When heavy rains arrived, a large swath of Bayside Hills experienced huge floods damaging our homes and cars. Bayside Hills residents to remember whenever at all Back then those rains made sections of Bayside Hills look like a quagmire, while at the same time manhole covers would shoot ten to twenty feet into the air and then crash dangerously to the ground. Following six years of lobbying, with the assistance of former Community Board 11 Chair Jerry lannece, there was a three-pronged initiative including installing new combined storm sewers in the Bayside Hills area; a restoration of the ravine and Oakland Lake Park and; a completion of the \$25 million Alley Creek/Oakland Ravine Combined Sewer Overflow project. Another BHCA achievement also involved a lengthy, massive effort. Believe it or not, at one time our identity of "Bayside Hills," the name for our community that is nowadays easily recognized and accepted, had disappeared. Our community suffered an identity crisis when the Postal Service referred to Bayside Hills as "Flushing" or "Oakland Gardens," despite its being a separate entity. Homeowners in the northern central section of zip code 11364 fought to have their community of single-family homes clearly discernible from Oakland Gardens, where the Post Office is located, with its two-family homes, high rise buildings and garden apartments. Finally, when the BHCA enlisted the Hills was beginning to be recognized as an official town designation once again. Our next step was that for many years we asked our elected officials to remind the databases of map indicators such as Google Maps, Magellan, Mapquest, etc. to recognize us as Bayside Hills. We repeatedly asked the offices of our congressional representatives to do this for us by sending out reminders. We also frequently asked our possible to address all mail only "Bayside Hills." Now, more often than not our maps appears as follows:

To the community from BHCA board member and zoning chair, Joe Lubomski:

Community Board 11, our community board, voted against the City of Yes Plan. That vote against the City of Yes Plan is a positive step in preserving Bayside Hills as we know it. Also, it is good to see that BHCA board member and CB11 board member, Eileen Miller, was given credit for taking a strong stand on this most important matter. Bravo Eileen!

The preservation of Bayside Hills and other one- and two-family zoned neighborhoods within NYC is the most important concern that the BHCA has at this time. We must protect our 2A zoning!

What is disturbing are the comments by our Councilwoman Linda Lee: "Hope for the best and prepare for the worst." and "We need to advocate, we need to raise our voices, and also on top of that we need to negotiate". We should not be hoping; we should be working, advocating for our neighborhood. As for negotiating, there should be no negotiating for our R2A zoning. That is something we strived long and hard for and it should not be changed. The one- and two-family neighborhoods of NYC are gems of the city and should be preserved and protected. We should put our elected representatives on notice that any change to our R2A zoning is totally unacceptable and that they are expected to do everything in their power to protect it. R2A zoning is not on the table.

BHCA annual financial report - December 31, 2022

The Bayside Hills Civic Association represents over 1200 homes within the boundaries of Basyside Hills. Last year, 301 member households supported the Assocoiation through their annual \$25 dues and optional neighborhood beautification donations. Additional funds were collected from the Beacon newsletter advertisers and a non-BHCA resident friend.

Major cost categories included landscaping, printing and distribution of the Beacon post card bullitins, membership letters and postage.

A legislative member grant provided approximately \$5,000 worth of grass cutting services for our avenue malls. The NYC Parks Department serviced the Bell Blvd. malls. Due to inconsistent work, contractor services were needed periodically throughout the year. Beautification improvement projects included periodic clock maintenance, mall planter care, and 48th avenue tower copper roof caps.

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

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
